Socio-Cultural Autobiography

Due: December 2, 2009

When I first reviewed the syllabus and read about the assignment of writing an autobiography of my culture I have to admit that I was intimidated. My initial thought was that I was a typical American and could not imagine writing five pages about my culture. I have come a long way throughout this course and have realized that I do have culture. I have learned that culture is so much more than family traditions. It took some in depth searching but I feel that I have learned a lot more about myself. In addition, I feel that I have a clearer understanding of how my upbringing and other environmental influences have helped to shape the person and teacher that I am today. I also feel that many situations in my adult life continue to shape my role as a citizen and an educator.

The "Guidelines for Understanding Culture and Diversity" by Brenda Rodriguez was an extremely helpful handout that furthered my understanding of culture. I found the section about developing self-awareness particularly interesting. It seems obvious now that understanding your own culture can improve your understanding of other cultures but I had not really put much thought into that before. The personal inventory helped me to look at how my

culture and personal experiences have influenced my development as well as my perceptions. Furthermore, when answering the survey questions I was able to see more clearly how my experiences helped to support and encourage cultural diversity in my own classroom. For example, the question about social class made me think about the differences between my social class and that of my students. It also got me thinking about the expectations upon me as a member of the middle class compared to societies expectations of my students. If society did not expect me to be successful would I have worked as hard as I have to be the person I am today? Maybe, but I'm not so sure. Knowing the importance of this, I set high expectations for all of my students. I make sure the expectations are realistic because I do not want them to be frustrated. However, they understand that I know what they can do and that I will always be there to push them yet be supportive.

I can say for sure that the schools I attended set high expectations for myself and fellow classmates. Until the age of seven I lived in Johnston, Rhode Island, a suburban, predominantly white neighborhood. Then my parents decided to move to an even more suburban area, Smithfield, Rhode Island. They wanted my sister and I to be in an area that had a better school system. Even though the makeup of the neighborhood looked similar I noticed a difference in the school climate almost immediately. There was a tremendous amount of emphasis put onto material items and status. My parents made sacrifices for us to move there and we

did not have the money that the families of most of my classmates had. Regardless of this contrast I made friends and acclimated fairly quickly. I enjoyed my time in Smithfield and felt that I had a pretty normal school experience.

Not only did I get a poor grade but the comment back to me was that my favorite show was completely unrealistic. Is it that unrealistic that an African American husband and wife can be married with children and have successful careers? I was shocked by the comment and if I was the mature woman that I am today I would question that teacher and ask her to elaborate further about her comments. I find this relevant because this is an example of an educator who has grown up with their own set of values and beliefs that have shaped the person they

are and their perceptions about the world. Thankfully, I feel that I am a lot more sensitive to culture and bias than my former teacher was.

There are many other factors and experiences that have influenced my development. My parents have been a huge influence in my life. They raised me to work hard to achieve my dreams. They both valued education and understood its importance. However, I feel that this has caused me to make judgments about some of the parents of my students. I have to be honest that there have been times when I made assumptions that lack of parent involvement meant that the parents did not value education. My parents attended all conferences and school events along with talking with me about school each day and discussing and assisting me with my homework. I attributed these things as characteristics of parents who value education. Through my experiences including the reading and discussions throughout this course, I know now that it is not that simple. There are many different reasons that parents may or may not be involved in their child's education and it's complicated. I was quick to judge because of my past experiences.

I could discuss other areas of my upbringing that helped me to be the person
