Course Description: Focusing on the concept of the Renaissance from the fourteenth to the sixteenth centuries, this course surveys developments in painting, sculpture, and architecture in major European centers. As we look at the work of key artists, such as Giotto, Van Eyck, Bosch, Michelangelo, Dürer, Raphael, Titian, Brueghel, and others, we will explore among other topics the notion of the “rebirth” inherent in the term “Renaissance”; the development of pictorial space; and the position of painting in religious and intellectual culture. Interchange between Northern and Southern art will be explored, with constant attention to how materials and techniques, cultural context, and religious practice influence the form of the images in question.

Required Texts: John Paoletti and Gary Radke, *Art in Renaissance Italy*, Pearson/Prentice Hall, 3rd Edition, 2005 and Jeffrey Chipps Smith, *The Northern Renaissance*, New York: Phaidon, 2004. Both are available at the bookstore and on reserve at the library.

- B Good; demonstrates a solid grasp of the material and participates consistently in classroom discussions.
- C Average; demonstrates adequate comprehension of course material and participates sporadically in classroom discussions; work that is enough to "get by."
- D Below average; understanding of material and participation in class are poor, but just enough to pass.
- F Not passing; careless approach to course requirements and deadlines; little or no effort applied to essays and class discussions; poor attendance.
