Rhode Island College English 327 **Ethnic American Literatures**

Instructor: Dr. Stephen Brown

Course Description: In this course, we will examine the breadth of ethnic American Literatures, exploring issues of race and identity within an historical, cultural context. Readings will provide a counterpoint between traditional views of ethnicity with issues of fluidity and hybridity. We will examine the cultural landscape by exploring the interaction among the works of African American, Asian American, Arab American, Jewish American, Latina/o, and Native American authors to address issues of collective memory and history.

Course Objectives:

- Articulate an understanding the historical and cultural contexts for multiethnic literature:
- Demonstrate a knowledge of key concepts of the field including among others: "ethnicity," "the Other," "marginalization," "stereotype," "memory," and "discourse:"
- Analyze significant critical articles in the field;
- Reflect about his/her own ethnicity;
- Demonstrate the ability to address cultural diversity in the United States through discussing and writing about the literature;
