#### **Course Information:**

Attention will be given to synthesizing research, examining ethical practice, and promoting individual and group reflective practice for leading change. Accountability through critical inquiry and evidence-based decision making is emphasized.

## **Course Purposes:**

This course builds upon earlier courses, most particularly LEAD 507, to provide further study and understanding of organizational culture and leadership and theoretical concepts and practice for leading change in organizational contexts. School leaders' responsibilities inclusive of ethical and practical issues around individual and organizational change, including conflicts about power and authority, gender, race and fairness will be studied. Problems of group dynamics, integrity, responsibility, and self-understanding faced by those supporting or opposing changes and the use of research as an instrument of change are integral to this course.
